Jocelyne Saab's Short Bio

Born in Lebanon, Jocelyne Saab is a director, writer, documentary filmmaker and photographer. The Lebanese Civil War threw the one-time television presenter and newsreader onto the front line as a war reporter. In 1975 she made her first feature-length documentary, the award-winning Lebanon in Turmoil, going on to make many critically acclaimed documentaries, filming in Lebanon, the Spanish Sahara, Egypt, Iran, Vietnam and Kurdistan. Her feature film debut Suspended Life (1985), shot in Beirut during the Civil War, and was selected for Cannes. Award-winning Dunia (2006), selected for Sundance, was her second feature. Taking a new direction, Jocelyne is finshing art films for a museum in France and currently developing a musical feature.



Wong Tuck Cheong Bio

Wong Tuck Cheong is Honorary Secretary of NETPAC (Network for the Promotion of Asian Cinema). He is President of the Malaysian Film Club (Kelab Seni Filem Malaysia) based in Kuala Lumpur, and an Executive Committee Member of the International Federation of Film Societies (IFFS). He was also a member of the board of directors of FINAS, the National Film Development Corporation of Malaysia. He works as a senior editor at a private university in Malaysia. N. Shashidhara a veteran film society activist is also well versed with film making techniques and related evolving technologies. Academically, he holds a Masters degree in Media Studies from New School, a University in New York and recipient of Scholarships from Film & Video Arts, New York for experimenting with New Media & Technology. Having engaged himself in educational film making and conducting hands on film/video making workshops he has himself made several short educational films for Vishveshwariah Industrial and Technological Museum (VITM) & National Council of Science Museums (NCSM). He was associated with the Science Museum in Popularising Science amongst the general public using different mediums. He was the Founder Secretary of Society of Short Film Makers of Karnataka(SOSFIMAK) and Founder Trustee of Suchitra Cinema & Cultural Academy, Bangalore and publisher of its monthly Newsletter "Appreciation". He has assisted eminent filmmakers like Padmashri Girish Kasaravalli,Sri MBS Prasad and Late Sri M.V Krishna Swamy, Had Conceptualized Cinema Expo Exhibition while at VITM in 1977 and undergone Science Film Making Courses from FTII & CET (NCERT). One of the prime movers in starting Bengaluru International Film festival (BIFFES) he is presently the President Suchitra Film Society, Bangalore and Treasurer for Federation of Film Society of India.



JURY CHITRABHARATHI - INDIAN COMPETITION

Dr. (Smt.) Vijaya is an eminent Senior Film Journalist, Writer and Cultural Activist. She holds a Masters Degree in Kannada and her Doctoral thesis is on the plays of a distinguished Kannada playwright Sri Adya Rangacharya popularly known by his pen name Sriranga. She was associated in as many as 10 well known Literary and film magazines in Kannada and was Chief Editor of a cultural Journal "Sankula" dedicated to the cause of Fine Arts, Performing Arts and Cinema. She has published innumerable number of articles on Cinema, Literature and socio cultural issues focusing particularly on the plight of women in almost all the major Publications in Karnataka and has 18 books to her credit. She has also 17 titles of edited books in her name which include seminal works on History of Kannada Cinema, Post Independence Kannada Literature and Culture, and Visual Arts of Karnataka. She is the recipient of Karnataka Sahitya Academy and Media Academy awards in addition to number of other awards from various cultural Organisations. She has been part of Juries for National and Karnataka State Film Awards and a member of the Advisory Panel of Central Board of Film Certification. She has served in various Positions of a number of Cultural and Professional Organisations like Karnataka Film Journalists Association, Kalamandiram School of Arts. Abhinayataranga School of Drama and Suchitra Cinema & Cultural Academy.



ASHOK RANE, a noted Film Critic, Film Academician, Researcher, Writer, Scriptwriter and Filmmaker is also the Director of IFA - Indian Film Academy. He has been in film journalism since early 70s and during this long career he has been writing consistently and extensively on Indian and World cinema, as well. He has scripted a couple of TV serials and also film based programs for TV and Radio. He has half a dozen short stories to his credit which are published in the prestigious literary magazines. He has six books to his credit, namely, "Cinemachi Chittarkatha", "Chitra Manatla", "Anubhav", "Chitrapat Ek Prayas', 'Sakkhe Sobti' and 'Views & Thoughts on Scriptwriting' the first book ever written in India on film script writing. He received his first National Award for his book 'Cinemachi Chittarkatha' in 1996 and the second one as Best Film Critic of 2002. His book 'Sakhkhe Sobti'was awarded Kokan Marathi Vangmay Purskar in 2004. He has five documentaries to his credit as a director of which 'Masti Bhara Hai Sama 'was selected for the Indian Panorama of IFFI while 'Anthony Gonsalves : The Music Legend 'won him awards at IFFI 2011 & MIFF 2012. He also has two Marathi films to his credit, "Baaimanus" as screenplay-dialogue writer while "Katha Tichya Lagnachi ' is his debut film as a director. He has been part of Juries in a number of Indian and International Film Festivals and Awards.





Bitopan Borborah is a leading journalist, film critic and litterateur of Assam, India. He has authored four acclaimed short story compilations titled 'Moro Ata Sapun Aasii' (I too had a Dream), 'Bandook Nolor Botah' (The Air of the Gun Barrel) and 'Mannequinor Holle Jibon' (Life with Mannequin) and Budhoi Hahishe (Budha is Laughing) besides the immensely popular compilation of novels 'Virginity Aru Anyanya Upanyash' (Virginity and other novels). He won prestigious Munin Borkotoky Award for the debut compilation and also awarded with National Senior Fellowship by Ministry of Culture, Govt. of India. He is also the founder festival director of the 'CineASA Guwahati International film Festival', which will organize the fifth version in February 2013. As a member of FIPRESCI he has served as jury member at various National and International Film Festivals.



Dr Rashmi Doraiswamy studied Russian language and literature at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi. Her writings on literature and cinema have been published in prestigious Indian and foreign publications. She was the recipient of the National Award for the Best Film Critic in 1994. She was awarded the MAJLIS research fellowship in 1999 for a project entitled 'Changing Narrative Strategies of Hindi Cinema'. She is author of *The Post-Soviet Condition: Chingiz Aitmatov in the '90s* (Aakar, 2005) and *Guru Dutt: Through Light and Shade* (Wisdom Tree, 2008). She is editor of *Cultural Histories of Central Asia* (Aakar, 2009). She is co-editor of *Being and Becoming: The Cinemas of Asia* (Macmillan, 2002), *Globalisation and the Third World* (Manak, 2009) and *Asian Film Journeys: Selections from Cinemaya* (Wisdom Tree, 2010). She has participated in national and international seminars on cultural issues and has served on several statutory and non-statutory film festival and critics juries in India and abroad. She was associated for many years with *Cinemaya*, *The Asian Film Quarterly*, where she worked as Assistant, and later as Deputy and Executive Editor.



V.K.Joseph, Former Vice-Chairman of the Kerala State Chalachitra Academy that organises the International Film Festival of Kerala is an eminent Film Critic and Activist. He is the Chairman, Visual Media Co-operative Society (A cooperative venture of the serious film community for Film production and other Film promotional activities) and also Former Vice-President - Federation of Film Societies of India. He has published a collection of Poetry and a travelogue and writes regularly on films and other cultural issues in periodicals. Has Won State Government and Abu Dhabi Sakthi Award for the book Film and Ideology(cinimayum Prathyasasthravum) in 1997 and Won National film award (Suvarnakamal) for Best Film Critic of the year 2007. He is General Manager/Editor, Chintha Publishers (A leading publisher of books on literature, cinema, politics sociology etc). Has scripted and directed Educational Documentaries and Scripted for teleserials. Served as Jury member of many National and International Film Festivals and State film Award committees.

JURY - KANNADA COMPETITION





He also organizes Film Appreciation Courses, Seminars & Symposiums, Workshops & Lecture Sessions, Regular Film Festivals and so many other related issues with great enthusiasm. 



Synopsis

A circular story, told in flashback, in which eternal repetition is only interrupted by death in the form of a relentlessly linear railway engine. The central story is of the unhappy love affair between Kasturi, the Harijan (Untouchable) daughter of the railway level-crossing guard Dukhia, and Pratap, the Brahmin son of the grocer Mohan. At first, rumor and mob violence are deployed to lethal effect in order to maintain a 'traditional', oppressive morality. Later, when the main protagonists are about to conform and marry selected partners, rumor and maliciousness again intervene to trigger renewed violence until the on-rushing train of fate stops the strife.



About the director

Franz Osten (1876 — 1956) was a German filmmaker who along with Himansu Rai was among the first retainers of Bombay Talkies. Osten partnered with Rai on a number of India's earliest blockbuster films like Achhut Kanya and Jeevan Naiya. Franz Osten's silent films tell varieties of Indian stories. The Light of Asia (1925) dealt with the life of Buddha. Shiraz (1928) dramatises the events that led to the construction of the Taj Mahal. A Throw of Dice (1929) was based on myths and legends drawn from Indian epic Mahabarata.



Synopsis

The movie is about three friends: Soorya (Ramesh Aravind), Shashank (Akshay Anand) and Bhoomi (Hema). After finishing their undergraduate studies, Shashank goes to the US for further studies. Soorya starts his business in his hometown, and Bhoomi stays at home. After three years, Shashank comes back to India. He starts going off on India on his way from the airport, saying how much greater America is. While in India, his family arranges his marriage to Bhoomi. Soorya, on the other hand, is the one who truly loves Bhoomi and tries to tell her using recorded audio tape and plants it in Bhoomi's room having no idea that she is to be married to Shashank.





CHEMMEEN

(English title: Prawn)

Synopsis

The film tells the story of a pre-marital and later extra-marital relationship between Karuthamma, the daughter of an ambitious Hindu fisherman, and Pareekutty, the son of a Muslim trader. The theme of the film is based around the popular belief among the fishermen communities along the coastal Kerala State in the Southern India regarding chastity. If a married fisher woman was faithless when her husband was out in the sea, the Sea Goddess (Kadalamma literally meaning Mother Sea) would consume him.


About the director

Takeshi Kitano originally studied to become an engineer, but was thrown out of school for rebellious behavior. He learned comedy, singing and dancing from famed comedian Senzaburô Fukami. Working as a lift boy on a nightclub with such features as comic sketches and striptease

dancing, Kitano saw his chance when a comedian suddenly fell ill, and he went on stage in the man's place. With a friend he formed the comic duo 'The Two Beat' which became very popular on Japanese television. Kitano soon embarked on an acting career, and when the director of Violent Cop (1989) fell ill, he took over that function as well. Immediately after that film was finished he set out to make a second gangster movie, Boiling Point (1990). Just after finishing Getting Any (1994), Kitano was involved in a serious motorcycle accident that almost killed him. It changed his way of life, and he became an active painter. This change can be seen in his later films, which are characterized by his giving more importance to the aesthetics of the film, such as in Fireworks (1997) and Kikujiro (1999). Kitano is one of the best known directors in Japan today and a top star as well.



About the director

Humayun Ahmed (13 November 1948 – 19 July 2012) was a Bangladeshi author, dramatist, screenwriter, playwright and filmmaker. Ahmed emerged in the Bengali literary world in the early 1970s. According to the Times of India, "Humayun was a custodian of the Bangladeshi literary culture whose contribution single-handedly shifted the capital of Bengali literature from Kolkata to Dhaka without any war or revolution". His breakthrough occurred with the publication of his first novel, Nondito Noroké in 1972. As a writer, Ahmed often displayed a fascination for creating stories around supernatural events; his style was characterized as magical realism.

FOCUS ON LATIN AFOCUS ON LATIN AMERICA

Latin American cinema' refers collectively to the film output and film industries of Latin America. Latin American film is both rich and diverse, but the main centers of production have been Mexico, Argentina, Brazil, and Cuba. Latin American cinema flourished after the introduction of sound, which added a linguistic barrier to the export of Hoflywood film south of the border. For the purpose of BIFFES 2012, however, Mexico has been excluded from the term in its Latin America Focus since it is in North-America.

The 1950s and 1960s saw a movement towards Third Cinema, led by the Argentine filmmakers Fernando Solanas and Octavio Getino. In Brazil, the Cinema Novo movement created a particular way of making movies with critical and intellectual screenplays, a clearer photography related to the light of the outdoors in a tropical landscape, and a political message.

In Colombia, Carlos Mayolo, Luis Ospina and Andrés Caicedo led an alternative movement that was to have lasting influence, founding the *Grupo de Cali*, which they called *Caliwood* and producing many films as leading exponents of the "New Latin American Cinema" of the 1960s and 70s, including *Oiga, Vea, Cali de pelicula, Agarrando pueblo, Pura sangre* and *Carne de tu carne*. Cuban cinema has enjoyed much official support since the Cuban revolution, and important film-makers include Tomás Gutiérrez Alea. In Argentina, after a series of military governments that shackled culture in general, the industry re-emerged after the 1976–1983 military dictatorship to produce *The Official Story* in 1985, becoming the first of only two Latin American movies to win the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film. Other nominees for Argentina were *The Truce* (1974), *Camila* (1984), *Tango* (1998), *Son of the Bride* (2001) and The Secret In Their Eyes (2009, which also won the award).

More recently, a new style of directing and stories filmed has been tagged as "New Latin American Cinema," although this label was also used in the 1960s and 70s. The Argentine economic crisis affected the production of films in the late 1990s and early 2000s, but many Argentine movies produced during those years were internationally acclaimed, including El abrazo partido (2004), Roma (2004) and Nueve reinas (2000), which was the basis for the 2004 American remake Criminal.

The modern Brazilian film industry has become more profitable inside the country, and some of its productions have received prizes and recognition in Europe and the United States. Movies like Central do Brasil (1999) and Cidade de Deus (2002) have fans around the world, and its directors have taken part in American and European film projects. There is a movement in the US geared towards promoting and exposing audiences to Latin American filmmakers. The New En

It took under its wing a quarterly publication, Cinemaya, which provided a forum for mostly Asian critics, writers and scholars to document and evaluate Asian films and subsequently add them to the Asian cinema canon.

NETPAC's another major contribution is the institution of the NETPAC Award at international film festivals: as more Asian films were selected for exhibition for world audiences, a yardstick for quality was necessary that matched the competitive spirit fuelling the creative urges of young Asian filmmakers. 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

It was founded in June 1930 in Brussels, Belgium. At present it has members in more than 50 countries worldwide. The FIPRESCI often gives out awards during film festivals (such as the Toronto International Film Festival, the Cannes Film Festival, the Venice Film Festival and the Warsaw International Film Festival) to reward what they see as enterprising film making.

The FIPRESCI Award Winners Programme:

FIPRESCI, the International Federation of Film Critics, has been in existence for more than 70 years. The basic purpose of the organisation which now has members in more than 60 countries all over the world, is to support cinema as art form and as an outstanding and autonomous means of expression. This is done for cultural, not for political reasons, Interest is focused only cinema itself and its artistic development.

FIPRESCI International took the initiative in 1946 to institute FIPRESCI jury, at Cannes Film Festival, consisting of International film critics who awarded the prize to David Lean's BRIEF ENCOUNTER and Geroges Rouquier's FARREBIQUE.



Michelangelo Antonioni, (29 September 1912 – 30 July 2007) was an Italian film director, screenwriter, editor and short story writer. Best known for his trilogy on 'modernity and its discontents' — L'Avventura (1960), La Notte (1961), and Eclipse (1962) — Antonioni redefined the concept of narrative cinema and challenged traditional approaches to storytelling, realism, drama and the world at large. He produced enigmatic and intricate mood pieces and rejected action in favor of contemplation, focusing on image and design over character and story. His films defined a 'cinema of possibilities' more than a cinema of action.

Antonioni received numerous awards and nominations throughout his career, including the Cannes Film Festival Jury Prize (1960, 1962), Palme d'Or (1966) and 35th Anniversary Prize (1982); the Venice Film Festival Silver Lion (1955), Golden Lion (1964), FIPRESCI Prize (1964, 1995) and Pietro Bianchi Award (1998); the Italian National Syndicate of Film Journalists Silver Ribbon eight times; and an honorary Academy Award in 1995.

One of the recurring themes in Antonioni's films is characters who suffer from ennul and whose lives are empty and purposeless aside from the gratification of pleasure or the pursuit of material wealth. Film historian David Bordwell writes that in his films, "Vacations, parties and artistic pursuits are vain efforts to conceal the characters' lack of purpose and emotion. Sexuality is reduced to casual seduction, enterprise to the pursuit of wealth at any cost." Antonioni's films tend to have stark plots and dialogue, and much of the screen time is spent lingering on certain settings, such as the seven-minute continuous take in The Passenger, or the scene in L'Eclisse in which Monica Vitti stares curiously at electrical posts accompanied by ambient sounds of wires clanking. Virginia Wright Wexman summarizes his style in the following terms: "The camera is placed at a medium distance more often than close in, frequently moving slowly; the shots are permitted to extend uninterrupted by cutting. Thus each image is more complex, containing more information than it would in a style in which a smaller area is framed ... In Antonioni's work we must regard his images at length; he forces our full attention by continuing the shot long after others would cut away." Antonioni is also noted for exploiting colour as a significant expressive element of his cinematic style, especially in Il deserto rosso, his first colour film.



Paola (Lucia Bose) is the beautiful and jealously-guarded younger wife of a shady factory owner, Enrico Fontana (Massimo Girotti). In order to investigate her romantic history he hires a private detective, which ironically brings Paola back into contact with former lover Guido, with whom she resurrects a lost passion. Dogged by the suspicions of their respective mates, they are drawn closer to each other in the face of adversity, and begin to plot Enrico's demise. But when the challenge of being together falls away, will the passion start to wane?


Henri-Georges Clouzot

Henri-Georges Clouzot (August 18, 1907 – January 12, 1977) was a French film director, screenwriter and producer. He is best remembered for his work in the thriller film genre, having directed *The Wages of Fear* and *Les Diaboliques*, which are critically recognized to be among the greatest films from the 1950s. Clouzot also directed documentary films, including *The Mystery of Picasso*, which was declared a national treasure by the government of France.

Clouzot was an early fan of the cinema and, desiring a career as a writer, moved to Paris. He was later hired by producer Adolphe Osso to work in Berlin, writing French-language versions of German films. After being fired from German studios due to his friendship with Jewish producers, Clouzot returned to France, where he spent years bedridden after contracting tuberculosis. Upon recovering, Clouzot found work in Nazi occupied France as a screenwriter for the German-owned company Continental Films. At Continental, Clouzot wrote and directed films that were very popular in France. His second film Le Corbeau drew controversy over its harsh look at provincial France and Clouzot was fired from Continental before its release. As a result of his association with Continental, Clouzot was barred by the French government from filmmaking until 1947. After the ban was lifted, Clouzot reestablished his reputation and popularity in France during the late 1940s with successful films including Quai des Ortèvres. After the release of his comedy film Miquette et sa mère, Clouzot married Véra Gibson-Amado, who would star in his next three feature films. In the early and mid-1950s, Clouzot drew acclaim from international critics and audiences for The Wages of Fear and Les Diaboliques. Both films would serve as source material for remakes decades later. After the release of La Vérité, Clouzot's wife Véra died of a heart attack and Clouzot's career suffered due to depression, illness and new critical views of films from the French New Wave. Clouzot's career became less active in later years, limited to a few television documentaries and two feature films in the 1960s. Clouzot wrote several unused scripts in the 1970s and died in Paris in 1977.





Akira Kurosawa

Akira Kurosawa (March 23, 1910 – September 6, 1998) was a Japanese film director, screenwriter, producer, and editor. Regarded as one of the most important and influential filmmakers in the history of cinema, Kurosawa directed 30 films in a career spanning 57 years. Kurosawa entered the Japanese film industry in 1936, following a brief stint as a painter. After years of working on numerous films as an assistant director and scriptwriter, he made his debut as a director in 1943, during World War II with the popular action film Sanshiro Sugata (a.k.a. Judo Saga). After the war, the critically acclaimed Drunken Angel (1948), in which Kurosawa cast then-unknown actor Toshiro Mifune in a starring role, cemented the director's reputation as one of the most important young filmmakers in Japan. The two men would go on to collaborate on another 15 films. Rashomon, which premiered in Tokyo in August 1950, and which also starred Mifune, became, on September 10, 1951, the surprise winner of the Golden Lion at the Venice Film Festival and was subsequently released in Europe and North America. The commercial and critical success of this film opened up Western film markets for the first time to the products of the Japanese film industry, which in turn led to international recognition for other Japanese filmmakers. Throughout the 1950s and early 1960s, Kurosawa directed approximately a film a year, including a number of highly regarded films such as Ikiru (1952), Seven Samurai (1954) and Yojimbo (1961). After the mid-1960s, he became much less prolific, but his later work-including his final two epics, Kagemusha (1980) and Ran (1985)-continued to win awards, including the Palme d'Or for Kagemusha, though more often abroad than in Japan. In 1990, he accepted the Academy Award for Lifetime Achievement. Posthumously, he was named 'Asian of the Century' in the 'Arts, Literature, and Culture' category by AsianWeek magazine and CNN, cited as 'one of the [five] people who contributed most to the betterment of Asia in the past 100 years'.

Park Chan-wook (born August 23, 1963) is a South Korean film director, screenwriter, producer, and former film critic. One of the most acclaimed and popular filmmakers in his native country, Park is most known for his films Joint Security Area, Thirst and what has become known as The Vengeance Trilogy, consisting of 2002's Sympathy for Mr. Vengeance, Oldboy in 2003 and Sympathy for Lady Vengeance in 2005. His films are noted for their immaculate framing and often brutal subject matter.

Park was born and raised in Seoul, and studied philosophy at Sogang University, where he started a cinema-club called the 'Sogang Film Community' and published a number of articles on contemporary cinema. Originally intending to be an art critic, upon seeing Hitchcock's Vertigo he resolved to try to become a filmmaker. After graduation, he wrote articles on film for journals, and soon became an assistant director of films like Kkamdong, directed by Yu Yeong-jin, and Watercolor painting in a Rainy Day directed by Kwak Jae-yong.

Despite the extreme violence in his films, Park is regarded as one of the most popular film directors in Korea, with three of his last five feature films (Joint Security Area, Oldboy and Sympathy for Lady Vengeance) all drawing audiences of over 3 million. This makes Park the director of three films in the thirty all-time highest grossing films in South Korea.



In the DMZ separating North and South Korea, two North Korean soldiers have been killed, supposedly by one South Korean soldier. But the 11 bullets found in the bodies, together with the 5 remaining bullets in the assassin's magazine clip, amount to 16 bullets for a gun that should normally hold 15 bullets. The investigating Swiss/Swedish team from the neutral countries overseeing the DMZ suspects that another, unknown party was involved - all of which points to some sort of cover up. The truth is much simpler and much more tragic.

Fatih Akin

Fatih Akin was born in 1973 into a family of Turkish immigrants in Hamburg's Altona district. His father came to Germany in 1965 and worked in a carpet-cleaning company; his mother was a primary school teacher. He lives and works in the city's Altona district, the setting for several of his films. In 1993, his career began as an actor playing smaller roles in cinema and television films until 1995, when he presented his regular production company (Wueste Film) with Sensin, his first short film as an author and director.

He attended the Hamburg College of the Arts, and while shooting the short Weed (Getürkt, 1996) he continued to work on the screenplay for Short Sharp Shock (Kurz und schmerzlos, 1998). This drama marked the beginning of his career, bringing immediate success and several awards, including the famous Adolf Grimme Award, two nominations for the German Film Awards and the Bronze Leopard at Locarno. It was followed in 2000 by the road movie in July (Im Juli, 2000), filmed with an international team in Germany, Hungary, Romania and Turkey. Festival successes in Norway, France, Italy and even Canada and Los Angeles - where Akin's films each received audience awards - were evidence of the young director's ability to communicate with an international audience.

The one-hour documentary Wir haben vergessen zurückzukehren (2001) is a TV production in which Akin tells the story of his parents, who came to Germany with the first wave of immigrants from Turkey during the '60s. In this way he prepared the field for his next feature film, that led him to the far south of Italy in 2001 - in many respects the story Solino (2002) corresponds to Akin's own biography. It is about two brothers, the children of Italian "guest workers", who grow up in Germany and struggle for success and happiness. Solino was also nominated for that year's German Film Award.


In his film Head-On (Gegen die Wand, 2004) starring Sibel Kekilli and Birol Unel, the director and author returns to his own sombre beginnings. Nonetheless, this love story starting in a psychiatric institution and ending on the Bosphorus, is - or so Akin believes - evidence of an important development in his stories: "I have become wiser, somehow, and part of that is that the heroes of this film don't die. The two lovers go on living, and that's the main thing!" Head-On won among a lot of other prizes the Berlinale Golden Bear, the German and the European Film Award for Best Film of the Year.

Fatih Akin's next film was the documentary Crossing the Bridge - The Sound of Istanbul (2005) about the music scene in the Turkish capital, followed by the episodic, melancholic drama The Edge of Heaven (Auf der anderen Seite, 2007), which again won several important awards, among them the which again won done the Best Screenplay and four German the Cannes Award for the Best Screenplay and four German Film

His next film as director was also highly acclaimed although the film's subject is far more "entertaining": The affectionals neighbourhood comedy Soul Kitchen (a *dirty regional film* as Akin has put it), starring Adam Bousdoukos in the leading role, was celebrated by the audience at the Venice Film Festival, received stellar reviews from film critics and won



Juliette Binoche (born 9 March 1964) is a French actress, artist and dancer. She has appeared in more than 40 feature films, been recipient of numerous international accolades, is a published author and has appeared on stage across the world. Coming from an artistic background, she began taking acting lessons during adolescence. After performing in several stage productions, she was propelled into the world of auteurs Jean-Luc Godard (Hail Mary, 1985), Jacques Doillon (Family Life, 1985) and André Téchiné, who made her a star in France with the leading role in his 1985 drama Rendez-vous. Her sensual performance in her English-language debut The Unbearable Lightness of Being (1988), directed by Philip Kaufman, launched her international career.

She sparked the interest of Steven Spielberg, who offered her several parts including a role in Jurassic Park which she declined, choosing instead to join Krzysztof Kieślowski on the set of Three Colors: Blue (1993), a performance for which she won the Venice Film Festival Award for Best Actress and a César. Three years later Binoche gained further acclaim in Anthony Minghella's The English Patient (1996), for which she was awarded an Academy Award and a BAFTA for Best Supporting Actress in addition to the Best Actress Award at the 1997 Berlin Film Festival. For her performance in Lasse Hallström's romantic comedy Chocolat (2000) Binoche was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Actress. During the 2000s she maintained a successful, critically acclaimed career, alternating between French and English language roles in both mainstream and art-house productions. In 2010 she won the Best Actress Award at the Cannes Film Festival for her role in Abbas Kiarostami's Certified Copy making her the first actress to win the European 'best actress triple crown'. Throughout her career Binoche has intermittently appeared on stage, most notably in a 1998 London production of Luigi Pirandello's Naked and in a 2000 production of Harold Pinter's Betrayal on Broadway for which she was nominated for a Tony Award. In 2008 she began a world tour with a modern dance production devised in collaboration with Akram Khan. Affectionately referred to as "La Binoche" by the French press, her other notable performances include: Mauvais Sang (1986), Les Amants du Pont-Neuf (1991), Damage (1992), The Horseman on the Roof (1995), Code Unknown (2000), Caché (2005), Breaking and Entering (2006) and Flight of the Red Balloon (2007).

Rappeneau has written only for his own films, including *Le Sauvage*, starring Yves Montand and *Tout feu tout flamme* (1981), again with Montand, who co-starred with Isabelle Adjani. In 1990, Rappeneau directed a deluxe Technicolor film version of *Cyrano de Bergerac*, his adaptation of the classic French play by Edmond Rostand, starring Gérard Depardieu in what may become known as his greatest role. Rappeneau's film version is the most elaborate film version of the play ever made, and one of the most expensive French films ever produced. It is the only rendition of the play in the original French to be released widely. The 2003 comedy *Bon voyage*, co-written with Patrick Modiano, again starred Depardieu, this time with Isabelle Adjani.

Blue is the story of Julie who loses her husband, an acclaimed European composer and her young daughter in a car accident. The film's theme of liberty is manifested in Julie's attempt to start life anew free of personal commitments, belongings grief and love. She intends to spiritually commit suicide by withdrawing from the world and live completely independently, anonymously and in solitude in the Parisian metropolis. Girish Kasaravalli (India / Kannada)

Girish Kasaravalli (born 1950) is an Indian film director, in the Kannada film industry, and one of the pioneers of the Parallel Cinema. A gold medalist from the Film and Television Institute of India, Pune, Kasaravalli started his career in films with Ghatashraddha (1977). It won him the Swarna Kamal/ Golden Lotus and a few international awards as well. The film he made to complete his diploma, Avashesh, had earlier been awarded the Best Student Film and the National Film Award for Best Short Fiction Film for that year. Known internationally, he has won the National Film Award for Best Feature Film four times overall: for Ghatashraddha (1977), Tabarana Kathe (1986), Thaayi Saheba (1997) and Dweepa (2001). In 2011, he was awarded Padma Shri, the fourth highest civilian award by Government of India. Over the next 30 years he directed 11 films and a tele-serial. He has just finished his Koormavatara (The Tortoise Incarnation) which won the National film award for the best Kannada film of 2011. The International Film Festival of Rotterdam held a retrospective of Girish Kasaravalli's films in 2003.



Based on a story by eminent writer Poornachandra Tejaswi, *Tabarana Kathe* is the Kafkaesque story of Tabara Shetty, a lowly placed government servant. Tabara Shetty serves the government till his retirement. He is a dedicated worker and respects the system that sustained him for so long. But problems emerge after his retirement. Tabara never gets his pension money. In his failing old age, Tabara approaches the officials he had served. Except for a few sympathisers, nobody helps Tabara get his pension. Matters worsen when his wife and only companion falls sick with diabetes. She has a sore foot which turns to gangrene. Tabara tries all means to get his pension to treat his wife. After a few months, his wife dies. The pension money arrives after that. Tabara curses his higher officials and the system which ruined his life.

Rangajji lends the money Subbanna needs, thinking that Subbanna might help her find her husband's close friend Mr.Padmanabiah in Bangalore. Subbanna leaves for Bangalore. After the independence, Appa Sahib supports the government's view that the labourers who till the land own them. Venkobanna is angered to see this long awaited plan of his crumble due to the utopian views of Appa Sahib. After a brief illness, Appa Sahib leaves the house one day with a group of people to protest for the sake of the farmers never to return again. Months after this, Narmada learns that her husband has been imprisoned by the government. But no other detail regardinhg Appa Sahib comes to light. Narmada Thayi is the only one capable of handling the household. She seeks the help of Venkobanna to help her handle monetary issues. Meanwhile their adopted son comes of age. The story takes a surprise and unexpected turn when Thayi Saheba discovers that her adopted son is in love with Appa Sahib's mistress's daughter, who legally is his sister. She tries in vain to convince her son not to go against social ethics. With Chandri, Narmada Thayi sets out to find her husband. Together they travel to many prisons, but Appa Sahib is never found. Thay i Saheba must either save the son, who seeks the freedom to marry Chandri's daughter or save herself - since if she supports the marriage, she could be jailed. She tries to cancel the adoption, but no such thing as adoption cancellation existed then. She also tries to see if somebody can adopt Chandri's daughter, but adopting a girl child was never allowed. Finally, Thayi Saheba tells her son that he is free to do whatever he wants. She gets ready to face the serious consequence of the marriage. The film ends with Thayi Saheba waithing on the steps of her house and an angered Venkobanna arriving with the police and announcing their arrival.



DENMARK

Films Courtesy: Danish Film Institute Danish Embassy, New Delhi Denmark has been producing films since 1897 and since the 1980s has maintained a steady stream of products due largely to funding by the state-supported Danish Film Institute. Historically, Danish films have been noted for their realism, religious and moral themes, sexual frankness and technical innovation.

The Danish filmmaker Carl Th. Dreyer (1889–1968) is considered one of the greatest directors in the history of cinema. Other Danish filmmakers of note include the creator of the popular *Olsen-banden* films Erik Balling; Gabriel Axel, an Oscarwinner for *Babette's Feast* in 1987; and Bille August, the Oscar, Palme d'Or and Golden Globe winner for *Pelle the Conqueror* in 1988. In the modern era, notable filmmakers in Denmark include Lars von Trier, who co-authored the Dogme film movement, and multiple award-winners Susanne Bier and Nicolas Winding Refn. The members of the Dogme 95 Collective were von Trier, Vinterberg, Kristian Levring, and Søren Kragh-Jacobsen. Lars Von Trier's films *Europa*, *Breaking the Waves*, *The Idiots*, and *Dancer in the Dark* received great international attention and were nominated for numerous awards. The work of Susanne Bier, particularly *Brothers* (2004) and *After the Wedding* (2006), introduced the world to Danish actors such as Mads'Mikkelsen, Ulrich Thomsen, and Nikolaj Lie Kaas. *After the Wedding* was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film.



Synopsis - Anton is a doctor who commutes between his home in an idyllic town in Denmark, and his work at an African refugee camp. In these two very different worlds, he and his family are faced with conflicts that lead them to difficult choices between revenge and forgiveness. Anton and his wife Marianne, who have two young sons, are separated and struggling with the possibility of divorce. Their older, ten-year-old son Elias is being bullied at school, until he is defended by Christian, a new boy who has just moved from London with his father, Claus. Christian's mother recently lost her battle with cancer, and Christian is greatly troubled by her death. Elias and Christian quickly form a strong bond, but when Christian involves Elias in a dangerous act of revenge with potentially tragic consequences, their friendship is tested and lives are put in danger. Ultimately, it is their parents who are left to help them come to terms with the complexity of human emotions, pain and empathy.

About the director

Susanne Bier (born 15 April 1960) is a Danish film director best known for her feature films Brothers, After the Wedding and the Academy-Award-winning In a Better World. Susanne Bier was born in Copenhagen, Denmark. Her father was a German Jew who left for Denmark in 1933, and her mother's family were Russian Jews. She studied art and architecture at Jerusalem University before her acceptance to the National Film School of Denmark from where she graduated in 1987. She went on to direct various films in Denmark and Sweden, her first commercial success being the romantic comedy The One and Only in 1999.





Lars von Trier, who was born Lars Trier (30 April 1956), is a Danish film director and screenwriter. He is closely associated with the Dogme 95 collective — an avant-garde filmmaking movement — although his own films have taken a variety of approaches. His work has frequently divided critics and he has been highly controversial. Von Trier began making films at the age of eleven. Raised by a communist mother and a socialist father in an austere environment, he converted at the age of 30 to the Catholic Church. Von Trier suffers periodically from depression, as well as various fears and phobias, including an intense fear of flying. As he himself said in an interview, "basically, I'm afraid of everything in life, except filmmaking." His first publicly released film was an experimental short called *The Orchid Gardener* (1977) and his first feature film came seven years later with *The Element of Crime* (1984). Among many other prizes, awards and nominations, he is the recipient of the Palme d'Or, the Grand Prix, and the Prix du Jury at the Cannes Film Festival.

TAIWAN

The history of Chinese language cinema has three separate threads of development: Cinema of Hong Kong, Cinema of Mainland China and Cinema of Taiwan (or Cinema of Formosa). Taiwanese cinema grew up outside of the Hong Kong mainstream and that of the People's Republic of China. Taiwanese cinema is deeply rooted in the Taiwan's unique and rapidly changing history. Since its introduction to Taiwan in 1901 by the Japanese, cinema has developed in Taiwan considerably. Hou Hsiao-hsien and Edward Yang built up their reputations in international film and have been acclaimed. In addition, Tsai Ming-liang, an overseas Chinese student from Malaysia, has gained the world's attention as a Taiwanese director. New directors usually like to explore the theme of nostalgia and historical memory. However, Tsai Ming-liang put his focus on the lives of urban men and women. Among them, the early works, Rebels of the Neon God observed the empty life of young people. He is known for his tracking camera which he uses like no other filmmaker.



Laichun, her father and two mothers, uncle and grandfather are of different generations; thus they all think differently. Father is the family head, and because he believes he must continue on the family name ends up taking two wives. His first wife also feels the same way, and so allows the second wife. Laichun feels the abyss between her and her parents and ends up getting pregnant, but hits a wall when her boyfriend does not take any responsibility. When her father is hospitalized, she begins to understand her father and two mothers. She is finally growing up.

About the director

Born in 1961 in Jiayi County, Taiwan, Chang Tso-chi entered the film industry as an assistant director for Yu Kan-ping and the Hong Kong directors, Yim Ho and Tsui Hark. In 1988, he worked as first assistant director to Hou Hsiao-hsien in A City of Sadness. His directorial debut was Ah Chung (1996), telling the story of a conflicted young man against the backdrop of Taiwanese shamanist rituals Chang's latest film When Love Comes, was given a Gala Presentation at Busan International Film Festival in 2010, and has since swept several awards.



After witnessing the success of Cape No. 7 and the amount of effort that fellow director Te-Sheng Wei put in order to improve the quality of Taiwanese films and bring it up to international standards, Feng Zhu was deeply moved. 



THEMATIC FOCUS: ANTI-WAR FILMS

An anti-war film is a film that emphasizes the pain, horror, and human costs of armed conflict. While some films criticize armed conflicts in a general sense, others focus on acts within a specific war, such as the use of poison gas or the genocidal killing of civilians (e.g. Hotel Rwanda, 2004). Some anti-war films such as Dr. Strangelove or: How I Learned to Stop Worrying and Love the Bomb (1964) use parody and black comedy to satirize wars and conflicts. An anti-war film's goal is to show the physical and psychological destruction warfare causes to the soldiers and to innocent civilians. Other anti-war films are realistic in mode and try to depict war in its horror or its effects upon human beings and/or society.

COMING HOME (Original title: Coming Home)



Synopsis - Sally Bender is the wife of a Captain in the United States Marine Corps. He is sent over to Vietnam, and Sally is alone. With nothing else to do, she decides to volunteer at a local veteran's hospital, where she meets Luke, who went to high school with Sally. Luke was wounded and is paralyzed and confined to a wheelchair. When Sally begins to fall in love with Luke, she has to make a crucial decision about her life.

About the director - Hal Ashby was born the fourth and youngest child in a Mormon household in Ogden, Utah, on September 2, 1929. His father was a dairy farmer. After a rough childhood that included the divorce of his parents, his father's suicide, his dropping out of high school, getting married and divorced all before he was 19, he decided to leave Utah for California. A Californian employment office found him a printing press job at Universal Studios. Within a few years, he was an assistant film editor at various other studios. One of his pals while at MGM was a young messenger named Jack Nicholson. He moved up to being a full fledged editor on The Loved One (1965) and started editing the



films of director Norman Jewison. Itching to become a director, Jewison gave him a script he was too busy to work on called *The Landlord* (1970). It became Ashby's first film as a director. From there he delivered a series of well-acted, intelligent human scaled dramas that included *The Last Detail* (1973), *Shampoo* (1975), *Bound for Glory* (1976), *Coming Home* (1978) and *Being There* (1979). Great reviews and Oscar nominations became common on Ashby films.



Synopsis - Beginning in the 1930's, The English Patient tells the story of Count Almásy who is a Hungarian map maker employed by the Royal Geographical Society to chart the vast expanses of the Sahara Desert along with several other prominent explorers. As World War II unfolds, Almásy enters into a world of love, betrayal, and politics that is later revealed in a series of flashbacks while Almásy is on his death bed after being horribly burned in a plane crash.

About the director - Anthony Minghella was the son of immigrants from Italy, who own an ice-cream factory on the Isle of Wight, where Anthony was born on January 6, 1954. Minghella was employed as a scriptwriter on the British TV series Maybury (1981) and Inspector Morse (1987) and, as a script editor on the British TV series Grange Hill (1978), before succeeding as a dramatist in the West End, London's equivalent of Broadway. An Anthony Minghella film assured movie-goers would enjoy a film blessed with a literate script, superlative performances and first-rate production values. His great craftsmanship was apparent from the beginning, with the bittersweet comedy Truly Madly Deeply (1990),



in which the ghost of Alan Rickman comes back to his lady love, Juliet Stevenson, with unintended consequences. The theme of a ghostly love also was present in *The English Patient* (1996) his greatest success. It is for that film he will be best remembered. Minghella claimed that with *The English Patient* (1996), which won nine Oscars, including Best Picture and Best Director, that he had reached the heights of his directing career.

About the director

Lu Chuan is considered one of the most talented young directors in China. His insightful films have found new ways for the Chinese cinema. After receiving a Master's degree in film studies from Beijing Film Academy in 1998, Lu Chuan started as a co-writer for Black Hole, which became one of most-watched TV series in China. His directional debut, Xun giang (2001), aka The Missing Gun, was presented at The 55th Cannes Film Festival in May 2002, Venice in August and the Sundance at the end of the year. Lu Chuan had worked hard for 4 years on his third film, City of Life and Death since 2005. This epic film, previously titled Nanking Nanking, brings to the screen the untold story of Nanjing



Massacre by Japan during WWII in china. As the director's unique viewpoint, this film attracted more than 3 million audiences and created a amazing box office. After his third film, Lu Chuan became the fifth director in china whose film box office has passed the line; a hundred million.



He was raised Catholic and served as an altar boy. His first experiences as a theatre actor took place in 1971, in Prato. During that autumn he moved to Rome where he took part in some experimental theatre shows, some of which he also directed. In 1975, Benigni had his first theatrical success with Cioni Mario di Gaspare fu Giulia, written by Giuseppe Bertolucci. Benigni is probably best known outside Italy for his 1997 tragicomedy Life Is Beautiful (La vita è bella), filmed in Arezzo. and the film was awarded the Oscar for Best Foreign Language Film, which Benigni accepted as the film's director.

In 1942, Friedrich Weimer's boxing skills get him an appointment to a National Political Academy (NaPolA) – high schools that produce Nazi elite. Over his father's objections, Friedrich enrolls, seeing this as his ticket out of factory life to university and a good salary. During his year in seventh column (fifth form), this innocence is altered as Friedrich encounters hazing, cruelty, death, and the Nazi code. His friendship with Albrecht, the ascetic son of the area's governor, is central to this education; a night in the forest hunting for escaped Russian POWs brings things to a head.

About the director

Born in 1973 in Hannover, Germany, Dennis Gansel studied at Munich Film School HFF. Remarkably his first feature length movie Das Phantom (2000) (TV) was shot while he was still studying. Between his movies Girls on Top (2001), Before the Fall (2004) and The Wave (2008) he spent a long time struggling for the budget of the films. During these times he shot commercials.

German cinema got off to a fantastic start straight after the First World War, as the liberal atmosphere of the Weimar republic triggered an explosion across all creative disciplines. Film-makers responded by appropriating the techniques of expressionist painting and theatre, incorporating them into twisted tales of madness and terror—thereby virtually inventing what would become known as the horror film. With its angled, distorted set designs, tortured eye-rolling, and layers of dreams and visions, *The Cabinet of Dr Caligari* (1920) is generally acknowledged as a landmark of international cinema, not just Germany's own. Two years later came an equally groundbreaking film, *Nosferatu*—an unauthorised adaptation of Bram Stoker's novel *Dracula* that enshrined some of the creepiest cinema images ever recorded. They also marked the beginning of the careers of two great silent-movie directors, Robert Wiene and FW Murnau—the latter turned in more authentic masterpieces in the shape of *The Last Laugh* and *Faust*. But both were outdone by Fritz Lang, whose monumental *Metropolis* became the most ambitious, most expensive, and most influential silent film ever made.

The flight of intellectuals after Hitler came to power in 1933 virtually cleared out evey major name in German cinema: along with all the names above, Ernst Lubitsch, Michael Curtiz and Douglas Sirk also left. The only director to emerge from the Nazi period of any consequence is of course the infamous Leni Riefenstahl, whose documentaries Triumph of the Will and Olympia eulogised the Third Reich while harnessing her considerable filmmaking abilities. In the rubble of the post war decades, little of international consequence emerged; while the new waves were stirring across Europe in the late 50s and early 1960s, a divided Germany struggled along in Nazism's long shadow. Only occasional films, like Bernhard Wicki's Oscar-nominated The Bridge (1959), poked their head above the parapet. The drought was finally broken as the social and political ferment in West Germany reached a crescendo in the early 1970s. The explosion of radical politics was matched by an explosion of radical cinema: Fassbinder, Herzog, Wenders, Schlondorff, von Trotta, Kluge and Syberberg were the key names here. Alexander Kluge's Abschied von Gestern was the harbinger of New German Cinema in 1966, but it was Werner Herzog's extraordinary Conradian saga Aguirre, Wrath of God in 1972 that saw the movement have a serious and lasting international impact. Fassbinder's astoundingly moving Fear Eats the Soul soon followed; in the same year, 1974, as Wenders' Alice in the Cities, the first in his road-movie trilogy. The collapse of communism and the end of the cold war prompted a period of rethink and reorientation - and perhaps a crisis of confidence in German filmmaking. The logjam was broken in 2004 by newly populist examinations of the war and its aftermath. Even though it's been spoofed a thousand times, Oliver Hirschbiegel's Downfall is a still-lacerating account of Hitler's final days, while The Lives of Others took a hard look at the compromises entailed in the grinding state spy system in the former-GDR. But the greatest, arguably, came only two years ago - Austrian director Michael Haneke's The White Ribbon, which brilliantly diagnosed the roots of Nazism in a study of a small German village just before the first world war.

Cate Shortland is an Australian writer and director of film and television. She was born 10 August 1968 in Temora, New South Wales. She graduated from the Australian Film, Television and Radio School, where she received the Southern Star Award for most promising student. She has made several award winning short films: Strap on Olympia (1995), Pentuphouse (1998), Flower Girl (2000) and Joy (2000). Cate spent three years directing episodes of the Network Ten television series, The Secret Life of Us. In 2004 she released her debut feature length film, Somersault (2004), which was entered in the Un Certain Regard section at the 2004 Cannes Film Festival. Her second feature, Lore, had its
